# FULL MOON CORNER

Grade: M6 WI4 R, 400m Location: Arnica Lake, Banff National Park AB Base Elevation & Aspect: 2200m, Northeast facing First Ascent: Yamada Toshiyuki, Kikuchi Noboru, November 5 2017 ATES: Complex (3)



"I and Noboru made a new line at 2695m Unnamed peak. We saw one fixed anchor near the top of the route but it seemed to be used for rappeling so we believe we are the first people to climb this line. We named it Full Moon Corner since the full moon really helped us climb in the dark."

#### Approach

trailhead on Highway 93S.

Take the Vista Lake trail, continuing past Vista up snow to the next band and a gear belay. Lake itself and heading up through the trees to P2: Snow 60m the north end of Arnica Lake. Either cross the frozen lake or traverse around its bank to the cirque on its southern end. Bootpack up snow and scree along the wall on the left, and traverse along the base of the wall to the gash on the right side. Gear up in a cave below a massive chockstone. 2-3 hours from the road.



# P1: M5 50m

As for Unnamed Direct. Park at the Vista Lake Start from the left side of the cave in a right-facing corner and climb 20m of delicate slab. Head right at the overhang, exit the corner system and continue

Climb an easy snow slope to the base of an ice smear. Belay on the right wall with rock gear.

### P3: M5 WI4R 40m

Follow the ice smear to thin ice pillars (stubbies useful). At the upper pillar, protect on rock behind the pillar, wrap around and and climb the rock a few meters until the ice is fat enough to belay.

#### P4: 5.5 WI3 50m

Climb easy ice towards the overhanging wall. Traverse a narrow rock band toward the right to the base of a chimney.

### P5: M6 15m

Head straight up the chimney system, on steep terrain with good tool placements. Belay on the right wall just before a thin ice smear.

# P6: M5R 35m

Crux of the route - climb patchy thin ice with rock gear to protect. Ice screws are not useful at all. Delicate climbing leads to a upper shallow groove heading up to a snow slope and a rock belay.

# P7-9: Snow 150m

Keep going up the snow slope to the summit ridge. Descent

Downclimb and rappel the route.

#### Rack

Rock gear including cams, nuts and pitons. Screws including stubbies. Double ropes or single/tag.
